# Plum Cobbler Recipe

#### INGREDIENTS: FILLING:

8 cups of fresh plums / pitted and sliced

1/3 cup of Brown Sugar

1/2 Granny Smith Apple / Peeled and Grated

3 T of Cornstarch

1 tsp Ground Cinnamon

#### **TOPPING:**

1 Cup of All Purpose Flour

1 1/2 tsp of Baking Powder

1/2 tsp of Salt

1/3 Cup of Sugar

8 T of Butter

2/3 Cup of Heavy Whipping Cream

1 T of Coarse Sugar

#### **METHOD:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees
- 2. Combine filling ingredients in a large bowl. Spoon mixture into a 9" cast iron skillet or casserole dish.
- 3. Combine topping ingredients in a mixing bowl of appropriate size. Cut in butter with a pastry blender until it resembles coarse meal. Add cream and toss with a fork until moistened. Crumble dough over plum mixture. Sprinkle with coarse sugar.
- 4. Bake until golden brown and filling is bubbling.
- 5. Serve warm with Vanilla Ice Cream.

This month's Elder's Spotlight focuses our attention on one of the most stylish and classy ladies of her generation, Carol Robinson. Carol was born to Howard and Catherine Robertson on the Pine Ridge Reservation, where she was one of five children. Carol fondly remembered her time growing up and attending school. In her teens she attended the Catholic Boarding School located on the Crow Creek Nation in South Dakota.

When she graduated, she recalled the exciting opportunity of her first job, which was assisting migrant workers find employment. She recalled booking tickets on the train and sending migrant workers to sheep farms in western South Dakota, where the employees assisted in the shearing process and how the wool was prepared for shipping to factories that made yarn and other textiles.

Another highlight of Carol's career was working for the Gordon Weston Post. Carol enjoyed the many jokes and the comradery of the vets; it was the way they looked after each other that resonated with her. Whatever the vets needed, whether that was ride to town, groceries or gas; they were there for each other, checking up on each other ensuring that spirits were lifted when one of them were feeling down. Being a part of making the lives of people around her better, seemed to be the highlight of her career.

Carol remembered another elder in the community by the name Minnie Shepard. Minnie didn't have anyone that came to look after her, so Carol and her family began to look after and visiting her regularly. When asked what advice she would give to the future generations, Carol wished that more friends and relatives would visit their elders. She said, "You never know how much it means to them to receive visitors, it makes a difference."

Visiting this classy lady certainly was the highlight of my day!

You may have heard or seen an article written by the Soualiga Newsday, an online new source for Sint Maarten, The article is in regards to a donation made to the island's Mental Health Foundation. This article was published on May 8, 2023.

As it was explained in our General Council meetings, Native Nations Cannabis actively pursued an economic avenue for Cannabis Development on the island nation. An economic venture that would benefit the people of Wakpa Ipaksan and the island nation, who like us, had been subjected to historic trauma from colonialization to present times.

It is often customary, when dealing foreign nations, such as St. Maarten, to make gestures, as a sign of our commitment to improving the lives of its citizens through investments in their economy and social programs. Our donation was for \$5,000 and was made payable to the Mental Health Foundation for the island nation. As a result, our Request For Proposal was awarded to our nation.

As of last summer, the General Council heard from various cannabis ventures and many voiced their opposition to expanded economic investments beyond our borders. As a result, further investments in the island nation have come to a halt.

In speaking with President Reider, it is his hope that an investment in the island could be of benefit to both our nations. One possible venture is to revitalize a casino resort located on the island, a project that President Reider would like to re-introduce to our membership. President Reider believes in this investment and proposes a group of our membership to visit the island nation; meet their government and tour the proposed investment site. If this ventures is approved, it is our president's vision that a portion of the accommodations located on the resort would be exclusively for our use. More to come regarding this proposal.
