Funeral services will be 1:00 PM, Thursday, August 8 at St. Columba Episcopal Church in White Earth, Reverend Jackie Bernacchi, officiating. Interment will be in Calvary Cemetery, White Earth.

Friends may call 5:00 – 7:00 pm with a prayer service at 7:00 pm Wednesday at David-Donehower Funeral Home in Detroit Lakes and at the church 1 hour prior to the service on Thursday.

Eleanora Louise Boutwell was born February 28, 1936 in Sisseton, SD to Howard and Catherine (Cottier) Robertson. She is a 1954 graduate of Sisseton High School and then attended Haskell Institute in Kansas where she received a degree in Education. Eleanora was united in marriage to Clifford Peters. They lived in Germany where their first child was born. They divorced and Eleanora returned to Flandreau where she met Galen Boutwell while doing her laundry. They were united in marriage in 1961 in Flandreau. They lived on a number of reservations prior to moving to White Earth, MN in 1975.

She taught at the Circle of Life School in White Earth for over 40 years. Galen died in 1997 and Eleanora moved to Ogema in 1978. In addition to teaching, she enjoyed Ojibwe Crafts, sewing, BINGO and the Ojibwe language.

Survivors include 3 children: Clifford (Judy) Peters of Flandreau, SD, Kathryn Peters of Ogema, MN, Brent (Sharon Fischer) Boutwell of Ogema. MN, 5 Grandchildren, 6 great grandchildren (and one on the way), 3 sisters: Wanda Cadotte, Nancy Herrick and Carol Robertson, all of Flandreau, SD. David-Donehower Funeral Home is serving the family.

She was preceded in death by her brother, Sunny Robertson.







#### Knowing the signs of meth abuse might help you save someone's life.

Certain behavioral and physical changes are common among meth users. Signs of meth abuse include:

- Hyperactivity
- Drastic weight loss
- Dilated pupils
- Talkativeness
- Increased distractibility
- Tooth decay and loss of teeth
- Aggression
- Irritability
- Agitation
- Grandiose behavior
- Twitchiness
- Loss of interest in normal activities, such as food, water, sex, and sleep
- Getting "sketched out," or becoming agitated, nervous, moody, irritable, paranoid, and/or aggressive.
- Jumpy eyes
- Scratching, itching, or picking at skin
- Financial difficulties
- Not meeting financial obligations
- Absenteeism or tardiness at school or work
- Noticeable changes in behavior
- Cravings
- Social and interpersonal problems
- Impulsive behaviors
- Memory loss
- Bizarre and erratic behavior
- Repetitive behavior patterns that can last for hours, also called "tweaking" or "geeking."
- Sleep deprivation, resulting in hallucinations, delusions, extreme paranoia, or violence

# State at war with meth

Pierre, SD – Capital Journal – July 31, 2019 – According to the 2018 Statewide Drug Statistics report, South Dakota is at war with drugs – particularly methamphetamines. The state's war on meth is clearly illustrated in this report. Here's how:

In 2018, South Dakota law enforcement saw 3,684 arrests for methamphetamine. These arrests resulted in more than 45,918 grams -- more than 101 pounds -- of meth being seized.

"A 101 pounds of meth is still a lot of meth," said Tim Bormann, chief of staff with the Attorney General's Office. He relayed that, according to most scientists, 150 milligrams of meth (1,000 milligrams makes one gram) if taken orally is enough to produce a fatal situation.

Depending on the user's age, weight, health and other factors this might not kill them, but would still create a fatal situation. If injected, the fatal situation amount of meth is 100 milligrams. Smoking 50 milligrams can cause extremely harmful, serious ramifications (more so than the usual illegal use of it).

"Like all drugs, it's a sliding scale, and affects everyone differently," said Bormann. "For that, there is no hard and fast science." Bormann added that one gram of meth goes for around \$80 street value.

Bormann supplied the 2018 year-ending statistics for South Dakota showing methamphetamine arrests and amounts seized. These same statistics are broken down by county. In 2018, the Pennington County (Rapid City) Task Force saw 1,220 meth arrests, with more than

11,089 grams seized. The Sioux Falls Task Force saw 1,091 arrests, with more than 9,281 grams seized.

All but six counties -- Sanborn, Miner, Deuel, Hyde, Sully and Bennett -- reported arrests and/or seizures.

"It is possible that they did not make a drug arrest," said Bormann. "There are some counties that do not report, or only report partially. They could have arrests

but no drugs actually recovered, because the drugs were ingested or there were not enough remains in a measurable amount, such as dust remnants in a baggy."

Bormann pointed to Faulk County, where there was a meth lab was set-up, but it was discovered before any meth could actually be manufactured.

"The info is gathered by a combination of local and state law enforcement," said Bormann. "The Department of Criminal Investigation (DCI) then shares this with HIDTA which is the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area program run under the auspices of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). South Dakota is in the Midwest Area of HIDTA, which is run from offices in Kansas City, Missouri.

For Hughes County (Pierre)

there were 25 arrests and 86.361 grams of meth seized in 2018. Stanley County (Fort Pierre) reported two arrests and 3.61 grams seized. Sully and Hyde counties reported no arrests or seizures. Jones County had one arrest and 1,293 grams, and Lyman county had seven arrests and .871 grams seized.

Meth is not the only drug that law enforcement must deal with.

> "There is simply a lot of drugs. You are finding heroin amounts in all numbers of counties," said Bormann. "Fentanyl is just horrendous; it can scare a person."

> There are also prescription drugs being abused. They are misappropriated, stolen, or otherwise brought to the streets.

> Bormann tells of medical facility employees who are fired and then charged with stealing drugs (in mass or pill-by-pill).

The report includes a very long list of prescription drugs seized in drug arrests. "All of these drugs have a street value. If they are out there, there is a market," he said. Drugs can be stolen through big burglaries, or visitors taking unnoticed quantities. He tells of incidents where older people report some of their medication pills are missing, and they wonder if they over-used them without realizing it, lost them, or if someone took them.

"An arrest would not be

made if something is reported, but an investigation would ensue. Authorities would not arrest anyone without evidence or trail of evidence of someone having done something," said Bormann.

There is a multitude of ways this yearly and monthly reporting can be used," said Bormann. "We can study how things are traveling, like along the Interstate 90 and I-29 corridors. Like with Corson County; how can we partner better with tribal law enforcement in the next year. Can we add some action, or more law enforcement positions, to get this stuff off of the streets? Where are local and state partnerships effective? Are local guys having a hard time, without assistance, staying on top of things? It's never-ending on where and how these reports can be used."

Once a year in South Dakota

a destruction order is given. All seized drugs no longer being held in evidence are transported to one of the three labs (the State Lab in Pierre, a lab in Rapid City and a lab in Sioux Falls) to be destroyed.

🧸 Lee Allen Taylor, 71, passed away Friday, July 19, 2019 at Yuma, AZ. He was born November 4, 1947 in Pipestone, MN, to Ted and Berneice (Rice) Taylor. He received his education in Flandreau, SD. At the age of 17, Lee joined the Navy Reserve and soon after went active duty. He served for a short time on the USS Sedgwick County. Lee ultimately joined the U.S. Navy Seals. He served three tours in Vietnam as a member of Seal Team 1 and Boat Support Unit 1. He was stationed out of the Amphibious Base at Coronado, CA. Lee married Kay Spanton on August 27, 1965 in Flandreau. Over the years, they made their homes in San Diego, CA; Tomah, WI; and finally back to Flandreau and the Trent area. Lee and Kay have three children, Todd, Jason, and Reiko. Over the years, Lee wore many hats. He was a soldier, owned a door to door Carnation Milk route, was an owner/operator of semi-trucks, worked in plant management at Fort McCoy outside of Tomah, WI, as well as the Flandreau Indian School. Lee was a member of the FSST and proud of his heritage. He was the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribal Chairman for 1990-1992. Lee's most notable accomplishment was the successful legal battle that led to the tribe having complete ownership of its casino. He was also instrumental in acquiring land in the sacred Black Hills of South Dakota making the FSST the only tribe to own land in the Black Hills. Lee was the last of three generations of Taylor family pipemakers. He began quarrying pipestone at an early age and transitioned into becoming a well known craftsman. Lee enjoyed motorcycles, traveling, scuba diving, boating, and just about anything with a motor. At one point he even owned two planes. Lee spent a fair amount of time in the southwest around the Yuma, AZ, area.

Lee is survived by his sons, Todd (Andrea Anderson) and Jason (Robin), both of Flandreau; daughter Reiko of Sioux Falls; three sisters, Betty Taylor, Flandreau; Tody (Larry) Schaitel and Linda Rodefer, both of Tomah, WI; 12 grandchildren, Shaya (Kevin) Fritz, Fargo, ND; Forestte Taylor, Flandreau; Geno (Erica) Burshiem, Colman; Dylan Taylor, Flandreau; Zach Taylor, Sioux Falls; Taylor, Teralyn, Trish, and Garrett Cramer, all of Faulkton; Storm Bordeaux, Sioux Falls; Sully and Boone Taylor, Flandreau; three great-grandchildren, Ary and Ronia Fritz, Brooks Burshiem; and many nieces and nephews. Lee was preceded in death by his parents, siblings, Teddy Jr, Gaylan, Berneice, Pat Roy, Myron; granddaughter Caitlyn; with an honorable mention to his fallen military comrades, brothers, and teammates.

Funeral services will be 10:00 am Tuesday, July 30, 2019 at the Wicaicago Otipi Community Center, Flandreau, with burial in First Presbyterian Cemetery. Visitation begins 5:00 pm Monday at the community center.



As Chairman of the Board of the MN Two-Spirit Society he helped and assisted Native organizations in developing policies in the protection, safety, and non-discrimination of Two-Spirit/Native LGBTQ people in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. Lenny is a Board member to the First Nations Repatriation Institute, an Advisory Committee Member with the Capacity Building Center for Tribes, Two-Spirit/Native LGBTQ Advisory Committee Member for the Center for Native American Youth, Washington, D.C., LGBTQ Advisory Co-Chair Council Member for the Southwest Indigenous Women's Coalition, Advisory Council Member for The National Quality Improvement Center on Tailored Services, Placement Stability, and Permanency for LGBTQ and Two-Spirit Children and Youth in Foster Care, committee member for ACE-DV Leadership Forum with the National Resource Center for Domestic Violence, and a former Council Member for the MN HIV/AIDS Prevention and Care Council. 

#### Section 13-2-4 Certain Breeds Specifically Prohibited.

The Following dogs are hereby declared vicious and shall notbe allowed, owned or kept within the exterior boundaries of the Flandreau Santee Sioux Reservation:

- a. Pit bull Terriers and any mixture of pedigree which includes Pit bull Terriers.
- b. Rottwieller
- c. Any dog with Wolf breeding
- d. All animals of any mixture of pedigree of the above-named breeds.

Any person found to be in violation of this section of the Ordinance shall be subject to a fine to be set by the court. Any vicious dog shall be confiscated and impounded by the Animal Control Officer and shall not be returned to the Flandreau Santee Sioux Reservation.

NON- LICENSED DOG- A dog having no collar or tag indicating issuance by the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe.

**Section 13-1-3 Licensing requiremenes.** It shall be unlawful for any personor persons within the Reservation to keep, possess, or have in his custody or under his control, any dog or animals of the dog kind, without first having obtained a license to do so from the Clerk of Courts, as hereinafter provided and without having paid the license fee therefor. Violation of this section shall result in a fine to be set by the court.

**Section 13-1-4 License application.** Any person or persons desiring to keep, possess or have in his custody or control within the Reservation, any dog, shall on or before the 1st day of January of each year make an application to the Clerk of Courts for a license to keep such dog. Such application shall be in writing stating the name, sex, color and other distinguishing characteristics of the dog, and the name of the ower thereof, and that said dog has no vicious propensities far as known to the applicant. The application shall be made on a form provided by the Clerk of Courts and shall be filed with the courts.

Section 13-1-5. Fee/tag. An applicant for a license shall at the time of making such application, pay to the Clerk of Courts as a license fee the sum of three dollars (\$3.00) for each dog. A certificate by a registered veterinarian showing that such dog has been inoculated or has a continuing immunity against rabies within six (6) months of such application shall accompany the application. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of Courts at the time of the issuance of the license herein provided for, to furnish and deliver to said applicant, a metallic fiber or plastic tag for each dog for which such licence is issued, upon which tag shall be stamped or engraved the registered number of the dog and the year when registered. It shall then be the duty of the owner of the dog to place a collar around the neck of such dog so owned and kept by him, on which collar shall be securely fastened a tag so furnished be the Clerk of Courts. In the case of the loss of any tag so issued, the Clerk is authorized to issue a duplicate thereof.

# Coffee shop, roasterie planned for Wind Street



When Jessica Hovland opens her coffee shop this fall, she wants to fill a need she's been hearing about since Flandreau's only similar business closed more than a year ago.

While there are places to drink coffee in town, people often mention the need for another coffee shop after Bean and Vine's owner pursued a different business in May of 2018.

"We've heard some good feedback," Hovland said of Flandreau Bistro and Roasterie that will open in the former Pizza Ranch building. While she plans to start off with some simple menu items including soup, salads and sandwiches along with coffee, smoothies and Hawaiian ice, she plans to grow in what is offered. In addition, she plans to eventually roast the coffee right on site and sell beans to other companies as well. Hovland, who is the sole proprietor of the business under the LLC Pangica \_ a Dakota word for "awesome" \_ will turn over management to her husband Hovaka Bosin Sr. She will continue to work at her job with the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe and help with the family business on weekends.

Hovland and Bosin, who took official possession of the building Aug. 1, are working to freshen up the interior of the building, painting walls a modern gray and making repairs to sheetrock. She will have a family-oriented area on one side with a few books and toys and a quieter area for chatting on the other side. The building will have Wifi for customers who want to bring a computer in to work while enjoying their coffee or lunch. Hours of operation haven't been finalized, but the business will have a drive-thru window.

"We have a lot of room to grow," she said of the large areas that will hold tables and comfy furniture. "We have to grow and expand into the space."

Their business fills in most of the vacant spaces on Wind Street, where in addition to some long-time bars, there also is a Mexican restaurant and a liquor store in a renovated building that previously was shuttered. Bosin will train and become certified in roasting beans, a service the business will add later this year. The beans will be available for customers to take home or for other businesses and restaurants to brand as their own, she said.

Through research, Hovland hasn't found any other Native American coffee roasters in the area, a market that may offer potential. "It's a 100 percent Native American, woman-owned business," she said.

She and her husband, who also have an Hawaiian ice food truck, have been working on plans for the bistro and roasterie since January.

"It was a lot of work, a lot of time," she said of plans for the business hey have dreamed about. "The idea of a coffee shop has been there for a number of years."
