Strawberry Recipes

Wa-zu-ste-ca E-tan-han Wi-ya-tke To-pa (4 Cups of Strawberries) Mi-ni E-tan-han Wi-ya-tka (1/2 Cup of Water) Tuh-ma-ga-ca-han-pi E-tan-han Wi-yatke (1/4 Cup of Honey)

Place all ingredients in an appropriate sized pot. Bring to a simmer over medium heat until berries are broken down and a thick sauces is achieved.

Add Cornstarch, Gelatin, Sugar & Water in pot of appropriate size. Bring to a boil over medium heat stirring constantly to avoid scorching. Allow to cool.

Wash and Hull Strawberries. Cut in half and arrange neatly over prepared pie crust. When cooled, pour the strawberry gelatin mixture over the arranged strawberries. Place in refrigerator until set.

Serve with whipped cream!

Han Mitakuyapi. In 2020, I decided to fully pursue higher education and relocated to New Town, ND with my three daughters Rihanna, Dowan, and Azure in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. In December 2022, I graduated with honors from Nueta Hidatsa Sahnish College with an Associate of Arts in Business Administration. In January 2023, I relocated to Mandan, N.D., and began my bachelor's degree program at United Tribes Technical College. In October 2023, I was one of four students selected to participate in a 2-year apprenticeship program on campus. My apprenticeship is in the Human Resources department and will allow me to become certified with the Society of Human Resources Management (SHRM) upon completion.

On May 10th, 2024, I graduated with honors with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. I was awarded the Horizon Award: for demonstrating exceptional promise and continued success for the academic year, and the Virtuous Leadership Award: for exemplifying Native virtues in education and my walk of life for the academic year.



Recently, I was accepted into the Master of Business Administration Program with a concentration in Project Management at the University of Mary which I begin this fall. This is an 11-month, accelerated program designed to accommodate students in the workforce. Although this is a heavy courseload, it will allow me to participate in the hooding ceremony in April 2025 with the completion of my degree in August 2025. An MBA in Project Management will equip me with skills and knowledge in strategic planning, budgeting, resource allocation, and risk management to oversee and complete successful projects. This degree will also contribute to the advancement of my leadership and communication skills.

I plan to take a one-year break to get established in my career, and then enroll in the Master of Legal Studies of Indigenous People's Law for non-attorneys at the University of Oklahoma. This online 16-month graduate program aligns with my strong passion for protecting tribal sovereignty and Indigenous rights. The skillset and knowledge I hope to gain will allow me to advocate more effectively in the interest of tribal communities with a more in-depth understanding of federal Indian law.

My career goals are to work for a tribal community, preferably my own. I have a wide array of interests in the field of business including grant writing, non-profit management, human resources, and other administrative roles within healthcare and education. I do not know where my career path will lead me at this time, but I hope that it lies within the Wakpa Ipaksan amongst my own people. My educational journey has not been easy- it has been full of sacrifice, determination, and hardship, but it has opened doors to opportunities I hadn't imagined. It has contributed to the magnitudes of my growth and development both personally and professionally.

Governor Noem vs. the Nine Tribes of South Dakota

It's been a testy few months between the nine Tribal Nations within the State of South Dakota and it's Governor, resulting in the unanimous decision by all nine tribes to issue banishment orders against Governor Noem. The issue stemming from comments made during several of her speeches, where she attempted to address issues relating to the education of Native American children and law enforcement on the reservations.

All agree that the Governor's comments were ill advised and incendiary to all tribes within the state's boundaries. Our fellow nations began to issue banishment orders against the governor. Although our tribal leadership took a cautious approach, it wasn't until two months later that the outraged spread to our nation, culminating in an emergency meeting by President Reider to hear the outcry from some of the membership.

At the request of tribal elders, President Reider opened a communication channel with the Governor's office, which promptly arrange a meeting between the two governments. The meeting was respectful and productive.

During the meeting, the Secretary of Tribal Relations, David Flute, stated that this was the first time a tribal delegation came to meet with the Governor. We were shocked to hear this confession from a man whose sole purpose is to foster good relationships and government-to-government partnerships between the tribes and the state.

FLANDREAU, SD May 21, 2024

President Reider called an emergency meeting on Saturday, May 18th to address the comments made by Governor Kristi Noem and the potential for banishing her from the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe. The meeting was contentious at times, as some members vocalized their opposition. Out of respect for the elders, President Reider made contact with the Governor's Office, which promptly set a meeting between the two governments. That meeting took place on Monday.

President Reider and Vice President Weddell met with Governor Noem and addressed the recent statements made in reference to "Indian Country." The conversation was respectful and productive.

After months of discussion, observing and hearing the reactions of fellow tribal nations; today, the Executive Council continued their deliberations, which focused on the advice that the governor has received in communicating with the tribal nations and ultimately the effectiveness of that message, which all agreed, was ill advised and escalated the situation. The Executive Committee calls on the governor to reconsider the effectiveness of the liaisons she has appointed and whether or not they truly have an understanding of the issues affecting tribal nations as well as their ability to foster a cooperative relationships between the Tribes and the State of South Dakota.

President Reider informed the governor that a ban from our territories is imminent and requested that the Governor refrain from making future blanket statements that offend the tribes within the boundaries of the State of South Dakota, some of which depend on state services for the needs of their people. It was recommended that the Governor clarify her statements and issue an apology to all tribal nations for the misunderstanding. Until such a time, the Executive Council and the people of the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe stand with our fellow nations.

May 23, 2024 - Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe

In regards to fostering relationships with Tribal Nations, within the borders of South Dakota, it starts by understanding that we are all different nations. Flandreau being formed from exiles from the Dakota War of 1862, who after the signing of the Fort Laramie Treaty, converted to Christianity and took to agriculture as a way of survival. Our history much different from that of our fellow tribal nations.

It is unrealistic to believe that one person should know every facet of our culture or vice versa and we certainly do not expect any Governor to be a guru of Native American history, philosophy or to have an appreciation for our way of life. However, when choosing a secretary, whose sole purpose is to develop and foster relationships between the nine tribes and the State of South Dakota, isn't cultivating the advancement of diplomatic government-to-government partnerships; it's time to examine the effectiveness of this office. On Monday, we were shocked to learn that our delegation's meeting with Governor Noem was the first of its kind.

Secretary Flute of the State's Department of Tribal Relations was appointed to this position over 5 years ago. Our expectation of this office is to conduct itself in a manner that exemplifies its mission statement. As of today, two seats remain open on the Secretary's Indian Education Advisory Board, one seat belonging and unknown to the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe.

There are many areas where cooperation is essential between the nine tribal nations and the state, two of which relate to the comments made by the Governor; Education and Law Enforcement. In regards to the Governor's comments on the educational challenges of Native American children, you would think that someone would have informed her of the state's data that clearly shows, where there is diversity in the state's school districts, the ability of that district to meet the needs of all students regardless of race, declines significantly, while labeling children as disadvantaged and receiving state and federal funding for their efforts to educate our labeled children. In terms of law enforcement, our tribal police department works cooperatively with city, county & state police departments to ensure that our communities are safe. One of our fellow tribal nation's leaders describe the sheer differences between the numbers of law enforcement officers in Rapid City vs. the numbers on their tribal nation; a disparity not mentioned in the governor's comments.

In light of the recent expulsion bans, with Governor Noem at the center of the nine tribe's displeasure, we must join others in asking who is advising the governor. It clearly seems that the wrong advice has been given.

We would like to reiterate that our meeting with the Governor this past Monday, was a model of cordiality, respect and productivity, which only a face to face meeting can deliver.

The Governor providing this written statement to our Executive Council:

"It was never my intent to cause offense by speaking truth to the real challenges that are being faced in some areas of Indian country. I want to focus on solutions that lead to safer communities for all our families, better educational outcomes for all of our children, and declining addiction numbers for all of our people. It is my hope that the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe will give us the opportunity to partner together in a way that can be an example for all."

President Reider adding his thoughts:

"The far left wing and the far right wing are very far apart and don't realize they belong to the same bird. We all need to work together and as native people, we believe it all stems from the heart, which lies in the center of the bird. When you get too far from the center the balance is thrown off.

We need to come back to the center, find that balance by working cooperatively and respectfully with one another. Building a model that transcends our respective borders and if allowed to flourish, has the potential to unify a divided nation and provide a better life for all our citizens."



The Battle of Little Big Horn The Battle of Greasy Grass Custer's Last Stand

The Battle of the Little Bighorn, fought on June 25, 1876, near the Little Bighorn River in Montana Territory, pitted federal troops led by Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer (1839-76) against a band of Lakota Sioux and Cheyenne warriors. Tensions between the two groups had been rising since the discovery of gold on Native American lands. When a number of tribes missed a federal deadline to move to reservations, the U.S. Army, including Custer and his 7th Cavalry, was dispatched to confront them. Custer was unaware of the number of Indians fighting under the command of Sitting Bull (c.1831-90) at Little Bighorn, and his forces were outnumbered and quickly overwhelmed in what became known as Custer's Last Stand.

Our Tribe commemorates this day with a holiday. All offices are closed.
